Artist Statement—In June 2001, I took a bus from Edmonton to Guatemala City where I participated in an Arts and Cultural Study Tour organized by Mennonite Central Committee. I brought my sketch book along and drew the landscape from the bus window. Back home, I translated the graphite drawings into paintings using oils and acrylics. The first series remains in Edmonton with Margo Brunn's family. This current series was created last year. The planet Jupiter and the Earth Sciences symbolism reference a quirky theory and minor panic that erupted in the early 1980's around a unique planetary alignment, but this can be used as a time reference locating these scenes in 1983. This was the height of the trouble in the Guatemalan Civil War. The centrality of the Church architecture in these paintings allows us to ask questions about the role of the church on both sides of this conflict. It allows us to ask about the relationship between church and State, or Religion and Politics. As Mennonites we have long held that the reign of God is here in the present. I could cite the Schleitheim Confession, or I could talk about Robert Friedman's theological musings from the 1950's. But what does this mean? How does this idea shape the way we interact with this world? These are the questions I wish to raise in these paintings. -Paul Cook
